Typhoon "Trining" with 275 miles-per-hour center winds compounded by continuous heavy rains for more than 24 hours battered Baguio City and the mountain provinces Tuesday leaving 42 persons dead and six others missing and property and public works damages amounting to millions of pesos.

roads. Only Naguilian road has so far been opened to vehicular

Estimated damages to private and public property in Baguio mounted to P5 million. According to the city engineer's office, about P1.5 million will be needed to repair destroyed private properties and buildings; P300,00 for the repair of public buildings; P2 million for national and city roads; and P1.2 million to repair damaged telephone, power and water lines.

City Engineer and acting DPS Superintendent Ruperto Villalon said the amount may yet increase when all damage reports reach his office.

The typhoon disrupted light and water distribution and telephone connections. Some sections of the city are still without the three

public services.
In Benguet Province, Engr. Jose Solano, acting highway district engineer, estimated P1,273,800 worth of national and provincial road damages — P706,500 for national roads and P567,300 for provincial roads. Solano said it will take weeks to complete all repair

The damaged national roads are: Kennon Road, P208,500; Naguilian Road, P65,000; Halsema Road, P179,000; Abatan-Manka-yan-Cervantes Road, P72,000; Benguet-Nueva Vizcava Road.
